

Our Town Highlights in a Day

If you only have time for a day in each of our towns, here's how to make the most of them:

Darlington Point

Morning

By foot, bike or vehicle, **head off exploring** through the Willbriggie Regional Park to relax and enjoy the serenity of the Murrumbidgee River and River Red Gum forest. On a summer weekend, **book a kayak tour** down the Murrumbidgee River.

Afternoon

Book in for a tour at **Altina Wildlife Park** to experience the ultimate behind the scenes with some of Altina's most **magnificent animals**.

Evening

Enjoy a meal at the Punt Hotel, Darlington Point Sports Club or pizza and pasta from Rivedestra.

Coleambally

Morning

Take in the sounds of all the birds as your **stroll along the tracks** in the forests surrounding Coleambally. You'll be greeted by friendly locals, who **love the outdoors** and walking their dogs. Afterwards, head to one of the **coffee** outlets, such as The Coffee Nest café.

Afternoon

Take a tour of **Yarrow Park** to meet the owner, enjoy some free **wine samples** or walk to the **olive grove** and hear about the growing of the trees.

Evening

Enjoy a beverage or a meal at the Brolga Hotel or Coleambally Community Club or purchase some meat from the local butcher and **have a BBQ** in John McInnes Square.

Jerilderie

Morning

Get your walking shoes on and head for Luke Park for a **walk around the Lake** or be more adventurous and take in the surrounds and sights with a **walk along Billabong Creek**.

Afternoon

Enjoy a local favourite – chicken, sweet chilli and cheese pie from the Jerilderie Bakery, before exploring the sites of the **Ned Kelly Raid Trail from 1879**. In summer, enjoy an ice-cream from the Sticky Fingers Candy Shop once you've finished the sites.

Evening

Shout **the bar** like Ned Kelly did in 1879, or **enjoy** generous servings of **Chinese** from the Jerilderie Sports Club.


Darlington Point

Darlington Point is a thriving country riverside town set on both sides of the Murrumbidgee River and located three kilometres north from the Sturt Highway along the Kidman Way.

'The Point', as it's known by locals, is a popular spot for fishing, boating and camping on the 'Bidgee'. The country hospitality offered by the friendly businesses in town will ensure your stay is memorable.



History and Heritage



Up to **60,000 years ago**, the Country was occupied by First Nations. The local area was used by the **Waddi people**, part of the **Wiradjuri Nation**.

- 1829-30** | **Captain Charles Sturt** travelled the area and Darlington Point was established as a river crossing town with pastoral and timber industries.
- 1857** | Paddles steamers transported produce along the Murrumbidgee River.
- 1864** | **The Darlington Inn**, earliest recorded building of Darlington Point settlement, established on (modern-day) **Whitton Road**, then the main road from Narrandera to Hay. The Inn's site was at the junction of that road and the track that led to the river crossing.
- 1869** | **Riverine Hotel** (later renamed the Punt Hotel) was established on the south side of the Murrumbidgee River.
- 1881** | A public wharf was built (old wharf pylons can be seen 200 metres upstream from the caravan park).
- 1905** | The punt was replaced with a single **bascule bridge**.
- 1924** | Closure of the **Warangesda Aboriginal Mission**.
- 1978** | The new bridge over the Murrumbidgee River was opened, replacing the bascule bridge. The old bascule bridge was dismantled.
- 1989** | Locals, assisted by the Faculty of Engineering at the University of NSW, reassembled the old bascule bridge at the entrance to the caravan park.

Murrumbidgee River

The river is road accessible both upstream (Forest Drive and Beach Road) and downstream (King Street) of Darlington Point.

The Murrumbidgee River weaves its way from east to west through Darlington Point. Running through river red gum forests in Willbriggie Regional Park, it's home to native birds and wildlife. Head out on the water in a boat or kayak or take the forest drives to find one of the 15 secluded sandy beaches and spend an afternoon with family or friends.

Fishing and Boating

Fishing enthusiasts will be delighted with the sport on the beaches of the river around the township.

Winter is Murray crayfish season and a great time to head to the River. To fish in the Murrumbidgee River, you are required by law to pay the NSW Recreational Fishing Fee and have the receipt of payment of the current fee with you. You can pay the fishing fee at the Gum View Café, by phoning 1300 550 474 or online www.dpinsw.gov.au. Live Bait can be sourced from Davis Supermarket.

Water Safety

The aquatic environment around rivers and lagoons can be unpredictable. Please take note of these safety tips:

CHECK THE WATER CONDITIONS

Beware of fast flowing water, submerged objects and deep water.

Watch water levels in rivers as they can rise suddenly due to water releases from reservoirs and after heavy rainfall.

During droughts, check for submerged hazards that may now be exposed and beware of poor water quality.

Beware of steep, slippery or overhanging banks or paths.

SWIM SAFETY

Check the water depth before going in. River and lake bed conditions can change rapidly.

Never dive in head first, never jump into the water from heights. Always enter the water slowly.

Be aware of other river uses, especially boats and watercraft.

Never swim alone. Make sure that someone else is there to provide or get help.

Never use a tree rope swing. Tree rope swings are dangerous and are often associated with serious injuries.

Be aware of currents and undertows.

If you get into trouble in the water, stay calm. Signal for help, then float on your back feet first with the current. Don't panic.

If someone needs help in the water, stay dry and reach out to them with a stick or throw a rope.

Inland waters can be very cold. Beware of hypothermia even in summer.

Never rely on pool float toys to keep you safe.

Avoid drugs and alcohol around water.

Willbriggie Regional Park

Part of the Murrumbidgee Valley Regional Park, the Willbriggie Regional Park offers access to the Murrumbidgee River from both sides of the river.

- **North-West**

Access via Forest Drive (opposite Darlington Point Riverside Caravan Park)



On the northern side of the Murrumbidgee River, you turn north onto Forest Road. The track follows the river, winding and snaking along for about 10km before you arrive at Murrumbidgee River Road. The river meanders through River Red Gum and Black Box forest, and you are spoilt for choice with free camping and fishing spots. You can choose high on a bank overlooking the Murrumbidgee River, or close down on the sandy beaches on one of the river bends. There's a drop toilet near Whittakers Bend, but you'll need to bring your own drinking water.

- **North-East**

Access via Beach Road (opposite Darlington Point Accommodation Village)



Explore unspoiled beaches and areas of the Murrumbidgee River through the Wilbriggie Regional Park (East). Access from Darlington Point is via Beach Road on the southern side of Narrand Road. The road becomes dirt as you enter the Wilbriggie Regional Park. Explore beaches, such as Reserve Beach, Lady Jane Beach, Boomerang Beach, Waradgy Beach, Diggers Beach, and The Point Beach to pick out the best spot for you to relax at. Not suitable for caravans, but 4WD and camping permitted. Please obey all signs throughout the Regional Park.

- **South-West**

Access via King Street



Head down to the sandy beach at Whittakers Bend or check out 'Bunyip Hole'. Paths connect with the Goanna Walking Track.

Darlington Point Local History Museum focuses on the Courthouse and Police Residence, the town's oldest surviving buildings, dating from 1882. Exhibition spaces are being developed for these and other structures on the site and also a growing collection of artefacts and photographs.

CHECK PARK ALERTS

Always check the NSW National Park's alerts page for up to date information on closed parks and safety alerts.

PARK CLOSURES

There will be times when national parks and reserves will need to be closed or have access restricted.

FIRE SAFETY

It's essential that if you're planning hiking, camping or 4WD touring in a national park that you check with the local NPWS office first to get the latest fire safety information.

Goanna Walking track

Fig Tree Park, Punt Road



The Goanna Walking Track was developed after meetings with community elders. The 1.8km walk starts at the south east side of the Darlington Point bridge in Fig Tree Park and rambles downstream along the river, finishing at the clay banks, known by locals as the 'Bunyip hole'. The Bunyip is an aboriginal mythological creature who lives in deep water. It resembles a large black hairy dog with long pointy ears, big teeth and howls. During the 1930s, approximately 25 families lived along this section of the walkway, however only the bachelors lived close to the Bunyip hole. At the end of the walk, a meeting place with native garden, red gum table and seats has been constructed to commemorate the significance of the river to the Wiradjuri people and in respect for the community elders. Fig Tree Park

Punt Road



Situated on the bank of the Murrumbidgee River and across the road from the Darlington Point supermarket and pub, Fig Tree Park makes a great, green stop for a picnic or a barbecue on your travels. Take a stroll along the levee bank, catch up with friends for an undercover barbecue, or explore a little further along the Goanna Walking Track leading under the bridge.

Lions Park

CWA and Skate Park

Needing somewhere to stop along the Kidman Way or Sturt Highway with the kids? This park has it all. With outdoor exercise equipment, a skate park, barbecue units, sheltered playground, a kid's traffic course and plenty of room to kick the footy of the lovely green grass - you'll be able to stretch your legs and breathe in some fresh air!

Tiddalik Wetlands

Tiddalik Wetland is a pocket-sized wildlife sanctuary, and a quiet haven for walking, bird-watching and connecting with nature. Central to the area is a series of ponds planted with a range of aquatic species that provide habitat, and act as filtration of stormwater drained from adjoining streets. A picnic shelter is provided.

Bend (Clock Sculpture)

Carrington Street

"Bend" is a digital town clock and a free standing structure over 6 metre in height. The design was created by internationally acclaimed Australian artist, Jonathon Leahey. The sculpture reflects Darlington Point's hidden treasure and life blood - the Murrumbidgee River.

Opening Hours: 6am to 8pm, but may have to close at times due to poor weather or fire danger.

For day-trippers, Oolambeyan National Park provides excellent opportunities for birdwatching, picnicking and bushwalking. Find a shady spot for a picnic in the homestead's surviving orchard. There's an oval with a cricket pitch nearby and many historic buildings to see - great if you've got the kids with you. A day-use shelter with gas BBQ and stove is located south of the homestead. For the adventurous, management trails from the homestead can be explored by cycling or hiking.

Twitching

Stroll through the River Red Gums (Eucalyptus Camaldulensis) in the Willbriggie Regional Park surrounding Darlington Point, and feast your eyes on the abundant and colourful bird life - superb parrot, sulphur crested cockatoos, eastern yellow robins and kingfishers vying for branch space and on the lagoons, waterfowl such as pelicans, black swans, ibis, spoonbills and many types of ducks may be found. The occasional emu can also be seen.

Freedom on two wheels

Short family rides near Darlington Point include through Willbriggie Regional Park along Forest Drive and Beach road, testing your off road skills along the Goanna Walking Track along the Murrumbidgee River, or town ride exploring the streets and sights of Darlington Point.



You're bound to receive a warm welcome from the locals and notice the strong sense of community pride in Coleambally.


A town in a forest - a major objective was to preserve as many trees as possible when the town was being developed.



History and Heritage

The story of Coleambally is a story built on water. The community was explicitly built to take advantage of the additional water made available by the Snowy Mountains Scheme.

The scheme called for the water of the Snowy and Eucumbene Rivers to be diverted inland through a series of tunnels and dams, under the Great Dividing Range, and into the Murray and Murrumbidgee Rivers. The scheme has since been described as one of the Seven Engineering Wonders of the World.



- 1958** Construction of the main channel got underway with four large **Ruston Bucyrus Erie** draglines doing the bulk of the excavating.
- 1959** The first farms in the CIA were taken up. Farms were allocated using ballot system and generally "new irrigation settlers in the CIA were young married couples with children". **875 farms** were originally surveyed for allocation by ballot.
- 1959** **Gogelderie Weir** (which is the weir in the Murrumbidgee River used for diverting water into the CIA) was completed and officially opened.
- 1960** First water delivered onto the CIA farm through the **dethridge wheel**.
- 1968** The town established to service the farmers and families in the Coleambally Irrigation Area. The town is a planned community with gardens and streets named after local birds.
- 1968** Construction of **water tower**
- 1969** **Coleambally Rice Mill** opened
- 1974** Great flood of the Murrumbidgee River
- 1982** Drought and mouse plague

- 2000** **Coleambally Irrigation Co-operative** limited becomes a private company owned by the irrigators.
- 2010** Local growers planted cotton crops.

Jerilderie

The township of Jerilderie, established in 1859, is nestled on the banks of Australia's longest creek, the Billabong Creek, and is located on the Newell Highway, which is the main inland route linking Melbourne and Brisbane. Jerilderie (the English translation for the local Jeithi Aboriginal Tribe's word of 'djirridhuray'), meaning 'with reeds' or 'reedy place', is also the commencement of the Kidman Way.

Jerilderie is where bushranger Ned Kelly attempted to have his 8,000-word manifesto printed by the local newspaper editor in 1879. The historic town is the only NSW town raided by the Kelly Gang.



History and Heritage

Jerilderie was home to the **Jeithi Aboriginal Tribe**. The Tribal area was approximately 13,000 square kilometres, which extended north of the Murray River from west of Tocumwal to near Howlong, and to Jerilderie, Lake Urana and Lockhart. The last Jeithi elder **David Kennedy**, passed away in 1930.

1874 | **Sir John Monash**, honoured military commander, whose image appears on our \$100 note, attended Jerilderie Public School from 1874 to 1877. His name can be seen in the head office of the school as Dux. In later life he achieved Arts, Civil Engineering and Law Degrees at Melbourne University. During 1897-98, Sir John utilised both his engineering and legal skills as an expert witness and adviser to pastoralists, farmers and townspeople, who brought an action against **David and Samuel McCaughey** when they dammed much of the water on the Billabong and Colombo Creeks. In the First World War, Sir John Monash was a Lieutenant-General in command of the entire Australian Army Corps. Monash received a knighthood, which was presented to him by **King George V** at his battle headquarters in Bertangles, France, on 12 August 1918. Sir John Monash held the first **ANZAC day service** in 1916. Sir John was a leading and loved public figure after the war, becoming involved in many public and private organisations, such as the Boy Scouts.



1875 | Jerilderie's first bank - the Bank of New South Wales

1878 | Jerilderie and Urana Gazette commenced

1879 | **Ned Kelly Gang raid** - Jerilderie is the only town in New South Wales to be visited by the Ned Kelly Gang. From February 8th to 10th 1879, **Ned and Dan Kelly, Steve Hart and Joe Byrne** staged a hold up in Jerilderie. The Gang locked the police in their own cells, stole £2140 from the bank and destroyed a number of mortgage documents. The wires to the telegraph office were cut and Ned handed over the written account of his life actions to Edward Living, the bank accountant. This document is known as the **'Jerilderie Letter'**. It is thought that in addition to the cash, the gang targeted Jerilderie to have Ned's letter printed on the town's printing press. The Gang escaped into the forest which was south of Jerilderie. Today the original Jerilderie Letter is held at the **State Library of Victoria**.

1884 | Railway extended from Narrandera to Jerilderie (extended to Berrigan in 1894, Finley 1898 and Tocumwal 1914)

1926 | **The Yanko, Colombo and Billabong Creek systems** were augmented from the Murrumbidgee River to create opportunities to expand agricultural industry in the area.

1979 | Official opening of the man-made lake at Jerilderie


1987 | Railway line closed

Ned Kelly Raid Trail 1879

Jerilderie is the only town in NSW featured in the Ned Kelly saga and has more surviving authentic Kelly sites than anywhere else along the Ned Kelly Touring Route.

Jerilderie's Ned Kelly Raid Trail is a self-guided tour of the 16 sites visited by Ned Kelly and his gang in 1879. With 6 of the buildings directly associated to the 1879 visit still standing, It's a fantastic insight into how the town looked when Ned visited. The trail is an enjoyable and educational way to explore Australia's bushranger history. A comprehensive self-guided tour brochure, complete with timeline, has been developed for the Kelly aficionados to directly retrace the footsteps of Ned and his gang as they proceeded to carry out an event that was to become an icon in the annals of Australian history. Follow in Ned's footsteps, explore the sites and make your own decision: Ned Kelly, hero or outlaw?



1. Post and Telegraph Office

Where Ned Kelly ordered that the telegraphic machine be shut down and to cut down the telegraph poles. Eight poles in total were cut down.

2. Blacksmith Shop of Samuel Rae

Where Dan Kelly and Joe Byrne, dressed in Police clothes, rode their horses on 10 February 1879 to have them re-shod.

3. Site of the Riverina Hotel

On Monday 10 February 1879, the Proprietor of the Riverina Hotel, Martin Murphy wandered down to see why there was a crowd gathered at the Post Office and was promptly pressed by Ned Kelly to wield an axe to chop down the telegraph poles.

4. Courthouse Hotel

Built by John Hanlon who also built the Lauriston Hotel, 14kms from Deniliquin. The Lauriston Hotel is where Edwin Living, Teller of the Bank of NSW in Jerilderie, stopped to rest his horse and have a meal and allowed Mr Hanlon to make a copy of the "Jerilderie Letter".

5. Office of Michael J Curtin, Auctioneer

On at least two occasions in 1878, Mr Curtin sold horses at the Jerilderie Sales on behalf of 'owner', Mr Steve Hart.

6. Home of Sir John Monash 1874-1977

It was claimed that as a lad, Sir John Monash met Ned Kelly and held his horse for him, a claim never denied nor confirmed by Sir John, but doubted by future biographers of his career.

7. 63 Jerilderie Street

When Ned Kelly and his gang raided Jerilderie there were no buildings on this triangle of land. The significance of this site is in relation to instructions given by Ned Kelly to burn the documents that were held in the safe of the Bank of New South Wales as securities against loans made by the Bank. The Title Deed to this parcel of land is the only document unearthed so far.

8. Stories of JD Rankin, HD Rankin, Bank of New South Wales and Royal Mail

Where, on 10 February 1879, Ned Kelly, Joe Byrne and Trooper Richards entered the front bar of the Royal Mail Hotel, and informed the Licencee, Mr Charles Cox that he required a room for a few hours to put the people in as they came along "for I have come here to stick up and rob the Bank today". Whilst the captives were held in the Bar under the watchful eyes and guns of Dan Kelly and Steve Hart, Ned Kelly and Joe Byrne entered the adjoining Bank of New South Wales and acquired £691 of the Teller's cash till and a further £1,450 from the safe, as well as instructing all the Bank documents to be burnt.

9. Site of the Residence and Printing Office of the Jerilderie and Urana Gazette, Samuel Gill, Editor and Proprietor

On Monday 10 February 1879, Ned Kelly tried to find Samuel Gill to print the "Jerilderie Letter". Mr Gill, on realising something was amiss in the Bank, had taken off for 'Carrah Homestead' whereupon a messenger could be sent to 'Coree Homestead' and then onto Deniliquin to inform the Police. Ned tried to hand the now famous "Jerilderie Letter" to Mrs Gill who refused to take it, upon which Mr Living offered to take custody of it until Mr Gill's return when it could be published. Mr Living did not give the manuscript to Gill, but kept it himself, and it did not re-surface until more than 100 years after the event.

10. Site of James Mahood Saddlery Shop

Where Steve Hart, in the company of Thomas McDougall, Proprietor of the Albion Hotel, "acquired" a new saddle.

11. Site of the Traveller's Rest Stables

Where Steve Hart saddled up Mary McDougall's horse and rode it to the Police Barracks. After a successful plea by Rev J B Gribble to return the horse, it was let loose in the Police horse paddock.

12. Site of the Traveller's Rest Hotel

Where Ned Kelly shouted the Bar before departing Jerilderie, 10 February 1879.

13. Site of the Police Barracks, Lockup and Stables

Towards midnight on Saturday 8 February 1879, the Kelly Gang converged on the Police Barracks. After taking Senior Constable Devine and Trooper Richards captive, Dan Kelly and Steve Hart stabled the Gang's horses to the Police stables and released the Police horses into the horse paddock.

14. Jerilderie Courthouse

On Sunday 9 February 1879, Dan Kelly escorted Mrs Devine from the Police Barracks to the Courthouse for her to prepare it for the church service to be held there later that morning.

15. Site of the Woolshed Inn (Re-named the Pastoral Hotel)

The Inn where, on Saturday 8 February 1879 towards sundown, Ned Kelly and his Gang paused to share a meal and some conviviality.

16. The 'Park' Residence

At the time of the Ned Kelly Raid on Jerilderie in February 1879, the residence was occupied by the Church of England Minister, Rev J B Gribble.

Ned Kelly Raid Trail Timeline

Saturday 8 February 1879

- 8.00pm** Kelly Gang arrive at the Woolshed Inn
- 11.00pm** Kelly Gang depart Woolshed Inn for Jerilderie
- 11.30pm** Police Barracks surrounded, with Senior Constable Devine and Trooper Richards being captured and locked up in the 'logs'. Police horses turned out of the stables and replaced with bushranger's horses.



Sunday 9 February 1879

- 10.00am** Dan Kelly escorts Mrs Devine across to the Courthouse for her to prepare it for celebrating Mass.

Monday 10 February 1879

- 7:45am** Dan Kelly and Joe Byrne ride to the Blacksmith shop of Samuel Rea and have their horses re-shod.
- 9.00am** Dan and Joe leave the Blacksmith shop and ride over Powell bridge, following the telegraph line to find a location where the line might be cut without being noticed.
- 9.45am** Dan and Joe return to the Police Barracks and advise Ned Kelly they were unsuccessful in their tasks.
- 10.00am** Ned Kelly, Joe Byrne and Trooper Richards begin their walk downtown towards the Royal Mail and the Bank of New South Wales. Dan Kelly and Steve Hart follow on horseback.
- 10.30am** Party arrives at the Royal Mail Hotel. Dan Kelly and Steve Hart ride around to the rear of the Hotel and round up all those in the yard.
- 11.00am** Ned Kelly and Joe Bryne enter the Bank of New South Wales premises from the rear door, bailing up the Bank Teller, Edward Living, and the junior Teller, James Mackie. Both were escorted back to the parlour of the Royal Mail Hotel.
- 11.45am** Steve Hart and Edward Living go in search of the Bank Manager, John Tarleton, who is found having a bath in one of the Hotel's bathrooms.
- 12.30pm** Joe Byrne and Edward Living return to the Bank. Samuel Gill calls into the Police Barracks in search of news for his Jerilderie and Urana Gazette.
- 12.45pm** The Schoolmaster William Elliott calls at the Post and Telegraph Office to collect mail. As it's not yet one o'clock he decides to cross to the Bank and deposit the previous day's offerings to the church.

- 12.50pm** William Elliott enters the Bank and is bailed up by Joe Byrne.
- 1.00pm** Ned Kelly returns to the Bank with the Bank Manager. The inner draw to the safe is opened and the contents placed in a bag held by the Schoolmaster. Post and Telegraph Master, Henry Jefferson, goes to lunch at the Traveller's Rest Hotel.
- 1.30pm** All five people return from the Bank to the parlour of the Hotel.
- 1.45pm** Joe Bryne goes out the rear of the Hotel and mounts his horse to ride over to the Post and Telegraph Office.
- 2.00pm** Henry Jefferson, Post and Telegraph Master, return from lunch at the Traveller's Rest Hotel, to be confronted by Joe Bryne.
- Ned Kelly returns to the Bank with Herbert Tiffen, instructing Tiffen to remove documents kept in the safe, take them out into the Hotel's back yard, and burn them.
- James Rankin snr, Hugh Harkin and Samuel Gill enter the Bank and are confronted by Ned Kelly, Harkin and Gill escaping. Ned escorts Rankin next door to the parlour of the Hotel. Kelly and Rankin go to Harkin's store where Harkin is recaptured, along with customer, Rudolph Gartman. The four then return to the Hotel.
- 2:230pm** Ned, Trooper Richards and Edwin Leving go in search of the Printer, Samuel Gill, calling at his home and office located opposite the Hotel.
- 2:45pm** Ned, Richards, and Living walk around to the stables of the Traveller's Rest Hotel to inspect a racehorse that Ned had been told about.
- 3:00pm** Ned, Richards and Living return to the Royal Mail Hotel, and go across to the Post and Telegraph Office.
- 3:30pm** Ned Kelly, Joe Byrne, Richards, Living, Jefferson and James Rankin Jnr return to the Royal Mail Hotel.
- Joe Byrne and Dan Kelly ride their horses to the Police Barracks.
- Steve Hart goes into the Bank, taking Living's saddle, he walks over to the stables of the Traveller's Rest Hotel and saddles up the racehorse and rides it to the Barracks.
- Ned Kelly addresses the captives in the Royal Mail Hotel, railing against the injustices of the Victorian Police.
- 4:00pm** Ned Kelly leaves the Royal Mail Hotel for the Barracks with Jefferson and young Rankin.
- James Mackie goes down to 'The Park' to round up the horses of Tarleton and Living.
- 4:30pm** Living, and then Rev Gribble, call at the barracks to plead cases for not taking Living's saddle and the racehorse.
- Joe Byrne and Dan Kelly depart for Wunnamurra Station.
- 4:45pm** Steve Hart arrives at the Traveller's Rest Hotel and walks to the saddlery shop of James Mahood, along with Thomas McDougall, licensee of the Traveller's Rest Hotel.
- 5:00pm** Ned Kelly arrives at the Traveller's Rest Hotel, shouts the bar, buys some 'take-aways', and he and Steve Hart leave to join up with Joe and Dan at Wunnamurra Station.

'Doing the Bolt' is an exhibition of convicts and bushrangers, including the town's famous three-day encounter with the Kelly Gang in 1879. You can undertake a self-guided tour through the Old Printery (entrance via Jerilderie Library) to discover stories connected by 'the bolt of a prison door'. The exhibition is housed in the former office of the Jerilderie and Urana Gazette run in 1879 by Mr Samuel Gill. The Kelly Gang tried to track down newspaperman Gill on Monday 10 February 1879, to have Ned's 56 page manifesto printed.



Lake Jerilderie

Lake Jerilderie is a man-made lake which provides a safe waterskiing venue and fantastic recreational outlet for families. The lake is stocked with native fish and is frequented by many species of birds, including pelicans, ducks and swans. Lake Jerilderie is surrounded by an all-weather walking/cycling track and has a circuit of outdoor exercise equipment.

Memorial Park and Garden

Cnr Powell Street and Jerilderie Street



Home to the Jerilderie Cenotaph. It is a peaceful site created to allow people to reflect and honour the fallen and those who served and continue to serve Australia in War. The park is also home to a Leopard tank, decommissioned and donated to the Jerilderie community and Jerilderie RSL Sub-Branch in 2010. A garden, established and maintained by the Jerilderie Public School and St Joseph's Primary School, can also be enjoyed at this site.

Luke Park

Visit Luke Park, with its fun children's playground, fully enclosed and shaded. Enjoy a picnic or utilise the free barbecue facilities and undercover seating. Take advantage of the outdoor exercise equipment or be awed by the massive Steel Wings Windmill. One of only two of its kind in the world, the 50ft tall, 25ft diameter mill construction is an impressive sight. Made in Sydney in 1909-10, Steel Wings was acquired from Goolgumbula Station before being relocated to Luke Park in 1979.

The Billabong Creek is believed to be the longest creek in the world at 321kms. A public fishing pontoon is located behind the Jerilderie Sports Club.

Be sure to stop into the Council Chambers in Jerilderie Street to view the incredible mural gracing the walls of the chamber. Meaning Coming Together, the mural measures a massive 8 metres by 4 metres in size. It was created for the 2000 Olympic Games to provide a visual welcome to visitors for peace and safe travel. It was hung in Parliament House during the Games. The painting depicts various Aboriginal design elements including the Eaglehawk, which is the Barundji/Barkindji totem. It also depicts a white feather to symbolise safe travel, which is also a Barundji/Barkindji belief. It was created by four Barundji/Barkindji artists: Elsie Black, Gertrude Gittins, Eileen Ballangarry and Sos Hawkins. These women can trace their family back at least 700 years as direct matriarchal descendants of the tribe.



Horgan's Walk

Powell Street to Ashton Street

Walk over little foot bridges, sit among the gum trees and enjoy the flora and fauna within the Jerilderie oasis. This picturesque 20 minute walk allows you to enjoy nature as you wander, relaxing in tranquil surrounds, as the path meanders around the Billabong Creek. Sites include:



Powell's Bridge

In the early days of the town, no bridge existed in Jerilderie across the creek, although John Powell operated a punt to get people to the other side. Later, he built a timber bridge. The old bridge became unsafe with age, but a footbridge was erected in 1997.

The Willows

Named after the weeping willows which used to grow along the edge of the creek. "The Willows" was built in two stages during the 1880s and 1890s for the Wise family. The Wise Brothers ran the Jerilderie Flourmill, which adjoined the property. In the 1920s, the house was taken over by Dr Southey, who rent a surgery in the rear of the building.

Post & Telegraph Office

The tiny Jerilderie Post and Telegraph Office was built during the 1860s when Powell Street was considered Jerilderie's main street. The building is famous for its involvement in the Kelly Gang's raid on the town in 1879. The gang cut the telegraph wires so that news of their bank robbery wouldn't get out. Years later, the Office was used as a residence by a large family.

Plumbe and Neivandt's Blacksmith & Undertakers

A 'smithys' operated at the site of the Plumbe and Neivandt's Blacksmith's and Undertakers shop at least since the 1870s. In 1879, this shop was also visited by the Kelly Gang who had their horses re-shod there. Marcus Whitby, a wheelwrite, later built coaches on the premises. By the turn of the century, funeral directors shared the space. With the coming of cars, petrol bowzers were eventually installed at the front of the shop in Powell Street.

Jerilderie Public School

Jerilderie Public School was first erected during the 1870s, although the present building dates from 1876. With the school backing onto Billabong Creek, the creek has long been a favourite place for the children to 'muck about'. One of the town's most famous residents, Sir John Monash, used to build cubby houses in the bush on the north side of the creek.

The Swimming Hole

Until the construction of the Jerilderie Swimming Pool, the 'swimming hole', officially known as Horgan's Park, was maintained with a sandy beach, mowed lawns and changing sheds, situated above the flood line. There was a pontoon tied in the middle of the river, and once a year, the creek was divided into lanes for the swimming carnival.

Chinese Market Garden

At the end of Ashton Street, used to supply much of Jerilderie's vegetables.





Coleambally is the education hub of Murrumbidgee Council area. Coleambally Central School offers K to 12 education; St Peter's Primary School provides choice in the early years. Tirkandi Innaburra located outside the town perimeters on the Kidman Way, provides an innovative culturally based residential program for aboriginal boys aged 12-15 from across NSW and northern Victoria.
